STANMORE HOUSE: NEW FOR SEPTEMBER 2020

After a consultation with members of our Fan Court Community at the start of the year, the senior leadership team has agreed on 'Stanmore' as the new fifth house name. Stanmore was chosen because, like our existing Claremont Fan Court School house names, it represents a location rather than a building or person associated with our school. In the same vain as Norwood, the original location of Clear View School, Stanmore represents the early foundation of the pre-Fan Court school, when the support and generosity of others provided the time and space which allowed Fan Court to survive and ultimately to flourish.

Our inclusion of a fifth house has come about as a result of developing the Senior School pastoral structure to ensure that pupil care remains central to school life as the school grows. In September 2020 the Senior School will be moving to a vertical tutoring system, whereby tutor groups will consist of small numbers of pupils from each school year. This will encourage our pupils to spend time with peers from different year groups,



improve and consolidate peer to peer mentoring and will be more reflective of life outside of the school environment. Adding a new school house helps us to facilitate some additional pupils as well as ensuring our existing house tutor groups are not too large.

After regaling my husband about the amazing school that I attended in England, I was able to bring him there and have a tour to show off the "Downton Abby" beauty. I got my first flood of memory and emotion when driving up the regal drive, where at the end of term many Rolls and Bentleys used to pick up their girls and then there would be my American family of seven heaving up the drive in a VW bus! Mortified!

The entry hall looked exactly as it did between 1963-66, aside from the pupils' artwork and reception desk. The large room to the side of the entryway was lavishly furnished with plush carpet and couches where the headmistress, Miss Doran, used to read stories to us on Sunday afternoons in front of the cosy fireplace. Where the library is now was the dining room. We practiced our etiquette in there and enjoyed typical English high tea as well as all other meals. Upstairs the yellow classroom used to be my dorm with about 6 beds. I remember our lovely Irish Matron, Miss Patton, used to come in to say goodnight. She was a dear and I loved her accent.

I also remember the clunky elevator that was strictly verboten. We absolutely had to explore the mysterious basement where Clive's bath is. Back then there was nothing down there but dingy, cold stone floor and walls, dim lighting and the possibility of something scary in the dark corners. It was a delight to see that space used for art classrooms. Seeing the school change from a girl's boarding school to a busy co-educational day school was a big change but the basic beauty of the architecture remains awesome. Although I was a bit of a rebel there, I have always been proud of Claremont and grateful I had the opportunity to attend a proper English girls' boarding school - one with such history!

GORDON HUNT

In January 2020, after 8 years Gordon Hunt retired as Claremont Fan Court School Chair of Governors. Mr Hunt joined the governing body in 2005 but his association with the school goes back much further. Mr Hunt became a teacher at Fan Court School in 1967 where he and his wife, Barbara, were also house parents. After the schools amalgamated in 1978, Mr Hunt taught in the 'middle school' before being appointed as deputy head six years later. In 1989 he became deputy head pastoral in the Senior School and headmaster for a further 11 years.

In March 2020 we bid farewell to Marketing Manager, Judy Tilson, after almost 16 years as an integral part of the Claremont Fan Court School team. 
Pamela Fortune, teacher and boarding mistress (1989-1992)

On our return to school in January we received an email from one of our alumni, **Antonia Baker, nee Fortune, (1988-1992)** who kindly shared with us the very sad news that her mum, Pam Fortune had passed away over the Christmas holidays.

Many of you will remember Pam who taught in the middle school and was boarding mistress here from 1989-1992. Toni remembers that Pam really enjoyed her time at Claremont, she wrote of her mother's time here: "Life was busy as she was never off duty, between teaching and boarding duties but it was rewarding and she made some good friends here. She was a great teacher and her classes loved her."

She will be greatly missed by Toni, her two sisters and their families. Our thoughts are with them.

DID YOU KNOW?



THE VANBRUGH HOUSE

The mansion building that houses our senior school today was not the first house built on this site. The original house was built in 1708 by Sir John Vanbrugh, the architect of Blenheim Palace and Castle Howard. The plans for the Vanbrugh house are in the Victoria and Albert Museum and show a small square house with battlements, built at the lower part of the lawn to the front of the current mansion. Vanbrugh also built the White Cottage for his gardener.

In 1714 John Vanbrugh sold the house to the would-be Duke of Newcastle, who significantly increased the property size and parkland by some 300 acres. The Duke enlisted William Kent to landscape the gardens, and construct the boundary walls. The ha-ha wall can still be seen at the rear of the current mansion and preserves an uninterrupted view of the parkland at the rear. Over recent years the ha-ha walls have undergone a full programme of refurbishment and restoration.

In 1768 on the death of the Duke the estate was brought by Lord Clive, who decided to demolish the original house and build a new one at the top of the hill. This was partly due to damp and partly because he could not understand why someone would build a property that could not take advantage of the fabulous views. Lord Clive employed Lancelot 'Capability' Brown to build the new property, working alongside a young Henry Holland, who would become Brown's son in law. The building work took 4 years and the interior was not completed until 1772.

Many of the fireplaces that still exist in the mansion today were moved from Vanbrugh's original house.





SCHOOL NEWS

COVID-19 - A MESSAGE FROM THE HEADMASTER

Dear alumni.

Even before Boris Johnson's announcement on Wednesday 18 March we had been considering the right approach to the COVID-19 situation for our pupils and, on Friday 20 March, Claremont Fan Court School moved to remote teaching.

I do not underestimate the issues that remote learning creates, but it is our duty to keep our children and staff safe and well, while ensuring we can deliver the best standard of teaching and learning available. We had anticipated reaching this stage for some weeks, and each school already had clear plans for delivering remote learning, maintaining pastoral oversight and for ensuring quality assurance. We have the advantage for pupils from year 4 making use of the school laptops and the benefits of Google classroom, and we have sent home learning packs for younger children. We are also rolling out conference calling for some lessons, and this

will increase after the Easter break. Thankfully, technology enables a seamless process of submission, marking and returning of work in a way that was unimaginable before.

Parents and pupils in exam years have had a particularly challenging time, and we are currently working carefully on deciding the grades we recommend to the awarding bodies. We have reservations about this process, because it risks overlooking the fact that some pupils peak more than others in their June exams, but it is the fairest process that could exist, and we are making sure we are utterly rigorous in the recommendations we make.

None of us would wish to be in this situation, but our challenge is to make the very best of it, and that is our focus now. Given the decision to close belongs with the Government, the decision to open will also depend upon them. I am reminded that this is not the first time that the school has had to adapt to overcome a situation beyond

its control. In 1940 Claremont was forced to relocate to Llandrindod Wells in Radnorshire, Wales to protect its pupils and avoid the impact of war. On that occasion school life changed for six years before returning to Esher. While I hope that the COVID-19 lockdown continues for months rather than years, it is my belief that we will show the same spirit of resilience to carry us through.

Personally, I always miss the buzz of school life when Claremont is not in full operation. There is something quite delightful about the way our pupils use the campus and interact with each other and us. I hope this period is brief, but most of all we will be wishing and hoping for the health and wellbeing of our whole school community.


out theatres across the UK and he's delighted to be bringing it to Claremont. A percentage of ticket sales will be donated to the school's development fund to extend and renovate the JGC.
